FAIR FACTS

According to the laws of the state of Minnesota, all County Fairs must be operated by the county Agricultural Societies.

The County of Waseca owns the lands on which the Waseca County fair operates. They have leased the land to the Waseca County Agricultural Society. It is the responsibility of the board of Directors of the Society to correlate any and all activities that take place on the fairgrounds. The board of Directors is composed of fifteen members who serve for terms of three years. Directors are elected at the Annual Meeting of the Society which is held in November. Following the Annual Meeting of all members, all elected directors then meet and hold election of officers. Elected are: President, 1st Vice President, 2nd Vice President,. These elected officers, abiding by the Constitution and By-Laws of the Organization, carry out the policies and wishes of the board and coordinate the hundreds of activities taking place during fair week as well as the balance of the year.

The fair grounds are used for many different kinds of activities during the year in addition to the fair, such as: Auctions, RV vehicle storage, Dog Shows, Horse Shows, Class and Family Reunions, Archery Club, Sleigh and Cutter parade line up, Mock Crash, Bike Safety Rally, Relay for Life and various other community events.

EXHIBITORS

TIPS ON ENTERING ITEMS AT THE WASECA COUNTY FAIR:

- 1. All entries must have been made or finished in the past 12 months and cannot have been judged before.
- 2. You do not have to be a member of a 4-H Club or live in Waseca County to enter an exhibit. Rules appear below
- 3. Make a list of items you are going to enter, (example oatmeal bread, class 2 1-A Lot #1) This will help speed up registration.
- 4. Bring items to the fair to be entered in the Creative Arts Bldg. (west of the 4-H Bldg.) <u>Saturday</u>, <u>July 8 from 9 a.m.</u> to 12 p.m., <u>Sunday</u>, <u>July 9 from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. and Tuesday</u>, <u>July 11 from 7 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.</u> <u>See Textiles-Division L for special instructions regarding this category. Entries to the Fine Arts category-Division Q will be accepted on Tuesday</u>, <u>July 11 from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. only</u>.
- 5. Creative Arts Building will be closed at 5:00 p.m. for judging July 11 and will not reopen until Wednesday July 12 at noon.

- 6. July 12-16 check on your items to see them displayed and the ribbons you have won.
- 7. Please refer to page 4 for pick up times for Creative Art Entries. *Checks will not be mailed and will be voided if not cashed within 90 days.* For information call 507-475-1021.

GENERAL FAIR RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. No use of and/or possession of alcoholic beverages or other chemical substances on the fairgrounds unless in a confined area controlled by a fair board member or security.
- 2. No exhibitor shall be allowed to make more than two entries in any one lot. Exception: See rules governing specific departments.
- 3. Exhibitors may exhibit in open class from all counties in Minnesota plus any adjoining state unless stated otherwise in division.
- 4. No article or animal shall compete for more than one premium except livestock competing in teams or groups. This rule shall not bar sweepstakes or take special premium competition for which no entry is required.
- 5. Stock and articles may be entered in the name of the bonafide owners. Grain, flowers, vegetables, fruit must have been grown by the exhibitors thereof during the past year.
- 6. Every article in competition must correspond in number and description with the premium list and be in its proper class in order to obtain premiums. No charge or alteration will be admitted after the books are placed in the hands of the judges.
- 7. No article will be assigned to place on the grounds until entry has been made.
- 8. Each entry tag shall be securely attached to the entry itself or the stall, pen or receptacle in which it is shown.
- 9. No article or animal on exhibition will be permitted to be taken away before the time specified in each division.
- 10. Ample accommodations will be provided for all collections. No collection shall be allowed space that is not neatly arranged and fully labeled. A duplication of varieties in any collection shall disbar the collection from prize money. Standard varieties will be given preference.
- 11. Every animal and article upon the grounds shall be under the general control of the Association during the Fair, and while every precaution will be taken for safe keeping of the same, neither the Association nor its offices or agents will be responsible in any case for any loss, damage or accident that may occur. Due diligence will be used by officers of the Association to safeguard and prevent injury to persons; but the Association will not be responsible for accidents or injury which may happen to such persons through their own carelessness or disregard for rules and orders of the Association and its officers.

- 12. **NO** person will be permitted to distribute advertising matter on grounds except for their place of business or exhibit. The tacking or posting of any advertisements, bills, cards, etc., other than within the space occupied by exhibitors is strictly prohibited. The distribution of hand bills, flyers, heralds, etc., will not under any circumstances be permitted. Anyone violating this rule will be liable to a fine or expulsion from the grounds, as the Fair Board may elect.
- 13. Exhibitors in the Boy's and Girl's club work will be permitted to compete in the open classes by paying the entry fee.
- 14. Applications for exhibit space should be directed to the secretary.
- 15. Space assigned and not occupied by 11 a.m. of the first day of the fair, as well as fees previously paid will be forfeited.
- 16. All feature vaudeville acts will be given as advertised, unless unavoidable circumstances prevent the performance in which case substitutions will have to be made.
- 17. The management will consider it a kindness if persons will report any mistreatment or extortion practiced by any employees of the fair or concessionaire. Please use personal caution.
- 18. It is requested that no loud speaker system can be set up and operated by space exhibitors whereby causing hardship on the other parties showing their goods as wares.
- 19. The management reserves the right to refuse to exhibit any offensive or obscene exhibits, amend or add to the rules as in its judgment may deem advisable.
- 20. The Waseca County Fair Management reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with or incident to the fair.
- 21. No pets on grounds except service dogs with proper identification or animals that are a part of an approved competition or demonstration.
- 22. No motorized vehicles including but not limited to golf carts, ATV's, mopeds without prior authorization from fair management, except handicap assistance units.
- 23. No livestock trailers can be left on fairgrounds.
- 24. Any person or group that conducts a protest action must limit its activity to the location designated by the Fair Board. No entrances or exits can be obstructed or limited in any way. The designated location is by the rock located by the Horse Barn.



AWARDS

- 1. The superintendent of the division or some other person appointed shall assist the judges as clerk and shall keep a record of the awards made. This record when complete, shall be signed by the judge and returned to the secretary as soon as signed.
- 2. The awards on entries shall be designated by ribbons or cards as follows: First premium, Blue; second premium, Red; third, White; sweepstakes, Purple.
- 3. All awards shall be made by comparison of the individual merits of the entries.
- 4. Any interference by exhibitors to influence or dictate the decisions of the judges, will be sufficient cause for excluding him or her from competition, and shall be reported to the secretary through the superintendent of the division.
- 5. No appeal from the decision of the judges shall be allowed. Any exhibitor may make protests to the superintendent of the division.at the time of award, who may then require the judges to give reason for such placing.
- 6. No judge shall award any discretionary premiums. Whenever articles of superior merit are exhibited for which no premiums have been offered, the awarding committee may enter the same as "commended" on the book of awards so that the secretary may report the same to the Board of directors for future action.
- 7. Premiums will not be awarded on articles or animals of inferior merit regardless of the number of competition for a premium. The judges may award no premiums, second or first premium as merit may warrant, stating the reason in writing when requested.
- 8. Special premiums may be offered by interested persons for entries which conform to the general classification of the Fair Association.
- 9. All premium checks not cashed by exhibitor within 90 days will be considered a gift to the Waseca County Agricultural Society/Waseca County Free Fair.

The Waseca County Free Fair follows the MINNESOTA BOARD OF ANIMAL HEALTH 2023 EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK Entrance Requirements www.bah.state.mn.us

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS - All animals must be examined by the official veterinarian on the day they are admitted to the exhibition and at least once daily during the exhibition. All out-of-state animals must meet Minnesota importation requirements. No animal may enter or be at a public exhibition that is showing clinical signs of any infectious, contagious or communicable disease, including ringworm and warts. Always check with exhibition management for additional requirements.

OFFICIAL IDENTIFICATION for CATTLE and BISON For Import, Exhibition and Movement within Minnesota

Cattle must be officially identified prior to exhibition. The following are approved official identification for cattle. Official ID may not be removed from an animal once it is applied. National Uniform Ear Tagging. The following are current forms of acceptable official identification for cattle moving into and within Minnesota for any purpose:

- 1. National Uniform Ear Tagging System (NUES) Begins with the official state number; "41" for Minnesota
- 2. Animal Identification Number (AIN) System Consists of 15 digits, beginning with "840" - Includes "840" tags bearing the 4H logo • Visual or Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) • 15-digit RFID tags beginning with "USA" or 900-998 if applied before March 11, 2015
- 3. American Identification Number System Combines "USA" with 8 or 9 digits • Must be applied before March 11, 2015 • Includes the National Farm Animal Identification and Records (FAIR)
- 4. Breed Registry Tattoos and Tags Acceptable if accompanied by documentation listing the breed registration number • Pending registrations are not acceptable • Limited acceptance for interstate movement, see http://mn.gov/bah/official-id.html for details.

SHEEP & GOATS - Sheep and goats must be officially identified. No sheep & goat that is within 30 days of giving birth may be exhibited without prior approval from the Board of Animal Health.

SWINE - Swine must be individually identified with an ear tag or tattoo.

HORSES – Horses, except sucking foals accompanying a negative dam, must be negative to an official test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) conducted within 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition.

POULTRY - All chickens, turkeys and game birds at exhibitions, except baby poultry, must be individually identified with a leg or wing band. At exhibitions, all chickens, turkeys, game birds, and hatching eggs from these birds must be accompanied by a certificate or test chart approved by the board to show compliance with the following requirements:

1. Pollorum-typhoid – originate from a hatchery or breeding flock that is classified U.S. Pollorum-Typhoid Clean under the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP); or be negative to a pollorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to the opening date of exhibition.

2. Mycoplasma gallisepticum and Mycoplasma synoviae – all turkeys and turkey hatching eggs must originate from a hatchery or breeding flock that is classifiedU.S. Mycoplasma Gallisepticum (MG) Clean and U.S. Mycoplasma Synoviae (MS) Clean under the NPIP; or be negative to a Mycoplasma gallisepticum and aMycoplasma synoviae test within 90 days prior to the opening date of exhibition.

DOGS - Dogs four months of age or older must be accompanied by a certificate of rabies vaccination documenting that the dog is currently vaccinated for rabies.
